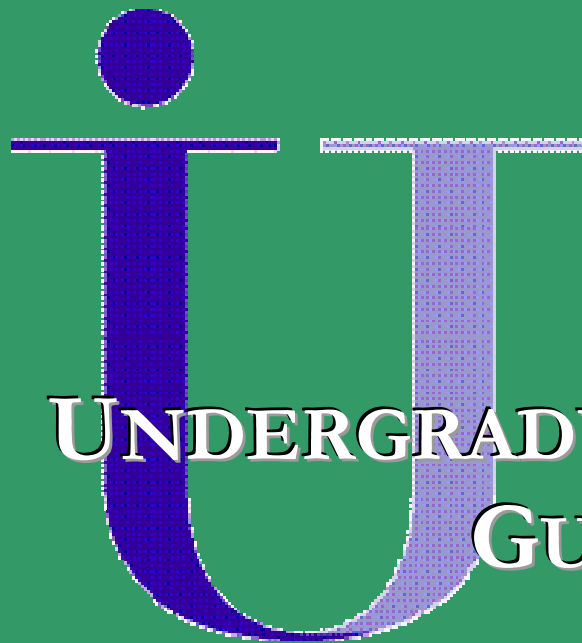

# ADMISSION, REGISTRATION and ADVISING

## New Student Admissions

### Step 1 Determine which program best meets your needs:

- If you are interested in a continuing education degree program, certificate, workshop, or wish to take a course for enjoyment or to earn credits for transfer to another college, please follow the steps below:
  1. Complete the application form on page S17.
  2. If applying to a degree program, send your high school transcript or GED transcript to the College of LifeLong Learning.
  3. Send official transcripts from any college or university previously attended for evaluation of credits earned.
- If you are interested in an accelerated in-classroom program, please call 800-37-ACCEL.
- If your interest is in a fully-online accelerated program, please call 610-647-4400, ext. 3085.
- If you are interested in teacher certification and possess a bachelor's degree, call 610-647-4400, ext. 3287.
- **International Students with a Student Visa (F-1)** Nonimmigrant international students who apply to Immaculata must meet special admission requirements. Please contact the Coordinator for International Students at 610-647-4400, ext. 3239.

### Step 2 Academic Advising

It is highly recommended that you meet with an academic advisor before pursuing a degree or certificate. The advisor will review all transfer credits, give information about program requirements, and help you select courses that meet your educational goals. Please call 610-647-4400, ext. 3238 to make an appointment with an advisor. Day and evening appointments are available.

## PAYMENT POLICY

All tuition and fees are due according to the term due dates shown below. Students registering after April 23 must pay in full or in accordance with the installment plan below. Late fees are assessed monthly on outstanding balances.

Tuition and fee payment is due in full for Summer I/Full on May 7, and Summer II payment is due on July 6.

Immaculata reserves the right to assign outstanding balances to a collection agency; student is responsible for all collection agency fees.

## INSTALLMENT PLAN OPTION FOR CLL STUDENTS (Student must enroll in plan to participate.)

Immaculata offers a free installment plan which allows CLL students to distribute their tuition over installment payment dates during a traditional term. Installment plan due dates are not based upon time of registration, but on dates shown below. Students must complete an enrollment form (available in campus offices or online at <http://www.immaculata.edu/node/651> under “Forms”) and forward this to the Business Office. Late fees are assessed monthly on outstanding balances

Select “Academics” from the list on the left. Choose “College of LifeLong Learning” from the drop-down menu, and then click on “Current Students.” Select “Policies” and then click on the topic of interest from the list.

Requests to drop or withdraw from a course must be made in writing to the CLL administrative offices. Failure to attend class does not result in an official withdrawal or relieve a registered student from financial responsibility.

## EMERGENCY SCHOOL CLOSING

In the event of a weather or other emergency, cancellations are posted on the university’s Web site, can be heard by calling the University’s main number 610-647-4400, and are announced on KYW radio (1060 AM) Philadelphia (#871 for Day classes; #2871 for evening classes). Unless an announcement is broadcast or students are contacted by an Immaculata University employee, classes will be held at the regularly scheduled time.

## SINGLE SIGN-ON THROUGH MyIU

Single Sign-On is accessible through the MyIU Web Portal. Once inside MyIU, students are one mouse-click away from accessing and using S.S.IU, where students are able to register, pay bills, and check final grades. Single Sign-On eliminates the need for using multiple passwords.

Username: First initial of First Name + Last Name                      i.e. jsmith  
Password: Birthdate in MMYDD format                                      i.e. 021577

You will be prompted to change your password upon first login. If you have a common last name, there might be a number after your username (i.e. jsmith2).

For assistance with MyIU and for password resets please call 866-588-3194 or 610-647-4400 ext. 3854. You will need to have your university id number available (A.... or C....).

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## EMAIL

Access your IU email account through MyIU. Follow directions listed above under “Single Sign On” to access the portal. Your email address is your MyIU [username@mail.immaculata.edu](mailto:username@mail.immaculata.edu), i.e. [jsmith@mail.immaculata.edu](mailto:jsmith@mail.immaculata.edu). **It is important for you to check your Immaculata University email often. Immaculata University will use this as your primary email.**

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## E2Campus - Emergency Information

Receive emergency and weather announcements by text message and/or email. Registration for this service is optional. Log onto the MyIU portal for more information and to sign-up.

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## ANGEL (Online Learning)

All online and web-based courses are delivered through ANGEL. Follow the directions above under “Single Sign On” to access the portal. Once logged in, you will find a tab for ANGEL.

# DROP/WITHDRAWAL POLICY

## Drop/Withdrawal Policy for Continuing Education Courses

Requests to drop or withdraw from a course must be made in writing to the CLL administrative offices, by email to [cll@immaculata.edu](mailto:cll@immaculata.edu), or courses may be dropped through S.S.IU prior to the start of the term. The cessation of attendance does not constitute an official withdrawal.

Please note, S.S.IU will not allow you to 1) drop courses after they have started or 2) drop the last class in which you are enrolled. These requests must be sent to your advisor or email [cll@immaculata.edu](mailto:cll@immaculata.edu).

Students taking online courses please note that, even if you have not logged onto an online course, the drop/withdrawal is processed based on the date that your written request to do so is received. The calendar week for online courses begins at 12:01am on the first day of the term.

All drops/withdrawals are processed based on the date/time that notification is received and in accordance with the policy below, and the amount credited to your account is based on the total cost of the course.

## Tuition Refund and Account Credit Policy

### Course 5-11 Weeks in Length

\*Please note: For classes meeting two or three times a week, drops will be processed based on calendar week. For example: A drop requested after first class meeting but prior to the second week of class will result in a credit of 80% of total tuition for the course.

Who Can Register Online?

Any College of LifeLong Learning student who has completed a credit course at Immaculata within the past two years.

For Which courses Can I Register Online?

All credit courses listed in this Course Guide are available for online registration. ACCEL students must register for cohort-based classes with their advisor or during an on-site registration visit. Students in the online program may register for all courses online; the Course Registration Numbers (CRN) specific to the online program will be provided by the advisor. Students wishing to enroll in non-credit workshops or senior citizens must register by phone, mail or in person in order to receive the reduced tuition rate.

Steps to Registering Online

1. **Set up an appointment with your advisor** to discuss your academic goals and determine course requirements.
2. **Login to Self-Service:** Go to [www.immaculata.edu](http://www.immaculata.edu) and log into MyIU:  
User Name: first initial + last name (e.g. jsmith)  
Password: initially set to Date of Birth (MMDDYY) or the last 6-digits of your University ID.  
Click on the S.S.IU icon.
3. **Check your Registration Status:** On the Main Menu, click *Student & Financial Aid, Registration, Registration Status*. Select a term (*Summer I and Full 2010 or Summer II 2010*) on the drop down menu. Click *Submit*. Your Registration Status will display student information such as Holds, Academic Standing, Student Status and Class, which may affect your ability to register for classes in the summer terms. To see more information about a Hold, click on *View Holds* at the bottom of the screen. Return to *Menu*.
4. **Look Up Classes:** Select *Look Up Classes*. Select *Summer I and Full 2010 or Summer II 2010* on the drop down menu. Select any combination of values to display sections and click the *Class Search* button. Scroll down the screen to view the sections and information such as “Rem” for number of seats remaining in the class. Please note, closed sections will be indicated with a C, sections that are not available for Web Registration will be indicated with an NR. Enrollment in NR classes may require written approval and a special form to submit to the Registrar’s office for processing.
5. **Register for Classes:** Select a section by clicking on the *checkbox to the left side of the search results list*. Click the *Register* button. This opens the Add or Drop Classes page. The class is added to your schedule. You can see it in the Current Schedule listing. “Web Registered” should appear in the Status column. Classes that were not added successfully will appear under Registration Add Errors. The status will denote the error. Click on *Submit Changes* to clear the errors. To select alternate courses or sections click on *Class Search* to return to the Look Up Classes screen and repeat the process.  
  
Another way to add courses is to click on *ADD or DROP Classes*, then enter the CRN numbers in the boxes under Add Classes Worksheet on the bottom of the screen. Click *Submit Changes* and the classes will be added to your schedule or you will see Registration Add Errors.
6. **Drop Classes:** On the ADD/DROP Classes screen select “*Web Drop*” from the Action pull down list to the left of the class CRN. Click *Submit Changes*, and the course will be removed from your schedule. Drops can only be done on the web until May 16 for courses in SUMMER I (5/17-7/2) and SUMMER FULL (5/17-8/16) sessions, and until 7/5 for courses in SUMMER II (7/6-8/16). All requests for drops or withdrawals must be made in writing to the CLL administrative offices. Please see page S5 for the Drop/Withdrawal Policy.
7. **Pay for Classes:** Click on *Registration Fee Assessment* on the bottom of the ADD/DROP page. Click on *Account Summary by Term* located at the bottom of the page. Payment may be made by credit card or check. Payment should be made in accordance with the payment plan listed on page S3. If you register after April 23 without making a payment, your account will be subject to holds and late fees.
8. **Print Your Schedule:** Now that you are registered, return to the Menu, click *Registration*, and select *Student Detail Schedule* to view and print your schedule. If you need to adjust your schedule later, consult with your advisor before making changes. Changes can be made on S.S.IU before the first day of each summer session.

Online registration for the Summer 2010 term begins on March 15. Some schedule changes may take place prior to the start of the Summer term. Access the listing of Summer courses online from the Immaculata University Web site ([www.immaculata.edu](http://www.immaculata.edu)) for up-to-the-minute information, changes in time/day/instructor, or additional course offerings.

Each course below is listed with its Course Number and Title, Registration (CRN) Number, Section, Credit Hours, Faculty, Time, Meeting Days, Building, Room and Fee. This information is necessary for you to register. Days of the week are coded as M (Monday), T (Tuesday), W (Wednesday), R (Thursday), F (Friday), S (Saturday), U (Sunday). Buildings are coded as LH (Loyola Hall), GC (Good Counsel), NH (Nazareth Hall), AH (Alumnae Hall), VM (Villa Maria).

 This course explores the history, folklore, and archaeology of Duffy's Cut, a mass grave of Irish workers dating from 1832 and located near Immaculata. This site has been investigated by a team from Immaculata's history department and was recently granted an official State Historical Marker by the Pennsylvania Historical and Museum Commission. Students explore the site's importance in the story of Irish immigration to Pennsylvania, experience the local railroad lore, learn about the ghastly ghost stories from the site, and observe first-hand the investigative techniques used by the history department team. The course includes a visit to the site of the historical marker.
