

Directions to Immaculata

From Lancaster Pike (Route 30): Travel east or west to Route 352; follow 352 South to the Immaculata entrance.

From West Chester Pike (Route 3): Travel east or west to Route 352; follow 352 North to the light at King Road; turn left; travel one mile to the Immaculata entrance.

From Philadelphia: Travel Schuylkill Expressway (I-76) west to Route 202; take 202 South to the Route 30 (Frazer) exit; follow 30 East to Route 352; turn right on 352 South; follow 352 South to the Immaculata entrance.

From Pennsylvania Turnpike (I-276) East: Travel to Exit 326 (Valley Forge); take Route 202 South to the Route 30 (Frazer) exit; follow 30 East to Route 352; turn right on 352 South; follow 352 South to the Immaculata entrance.

From Pennsylvania Turnpike (I-76) West: Travel to Exit 312 (Downingtown); take Route 100 South to Route 30; turn left on 30 East; follow 30 East to Route 352; turn right on 352 South; follow 352 South to the Immaculata entrance.

From Wilmington & I-95: Travel north on Route 202 to the Route 30 (Frazer) exit (one exit *past* the Route 100 North/Route 30 West exit); turn right on 30 East and continue to Route 352; turn right on 352 South; follow 352 South to the Immaculata entrance.

Once on campus, please follow the posted signs to The Great Hall (building #3 on the map below).

About the Workshop Presenters

Dr. Jeffrey Sternlieb will present on Multicultural Competencies: Integrating Diversity in the Mental Health Profession. Dr. Sternlieb specializes in leadership development, team building strategies and violence prevention, diversity training, and sexual harassment awareness. Through his company, Metaworks, P.C., Dr. Sternlieb's work focuses on four areas: People skills (leadership, communication, conflict and change management, team building), Company Culture (diversity and gender issues, violence prevention, ethics, etc), Stress and Burn Out, and Work-life Balance.

Dr. Dianne Salter will present on Ethical and Legal issues in Mental Health Delivery. She has an extensive background in legal and ethical issues as they relate to mental health practice. She is the Chief Operating Officer for Dimension Training Institute. The Institute offers training in a variety of areas including but not limited to cultural competency, racial, ethnic, gender, and cultural sensitivity in the workforce. Dr. Salter also has a private legal practice that concentrates on estate planning, family law, and civil litigation.

Dr. Yuma Tomes will present on Cultural Competence: Building Professional Competencies in School Psychology. Dr. Tomes has accumulated a diverse range of work experiences in the field of psychology and education over the last 10 years. He brings a unique perspective of clinical, teaching, research, and administrative experiences to his position at PCOM. Dr. Tomes major areas of research and interests are: cross-cultural psychology, multicultural psychological/educational assessments, cognitive/learning styles, and issues surrounding sexual minorities.

Dr. Douglas Schoeninger will present on Integrating Christian Spirituality and Healing Prayer in Counseling Practice. His private psychotherapy practice integrates spirituality and prayer as healing resources and is focused on the healing of persons and relationships within an intergenerational perspective. He is the President of the Association of Christian Therapists.
